Covid Concerns Prompt Shift To Online Meetings

Be sure to log on for important news about your co-op—and register for prizes!

With the rapid increase in Covid-19 cases statewide, East Central Electric (ECE) trustees voted to shift official meetings for Districts 1, 3, and 6 to the virtual realm. Instead of the traditional in-person meetings scheduled on August 4, ECE members within these districts will receive an official meeting

notice in the mail inviting them to visit www.ecoec.com. On the website they will find the ECE Annual Report, along with an informational video with pertinent highlights of ECE's past business year. District members will also receive instructions on how to register online for prizes. One \$100 electric bill credit and two \$50 bill credits will be awarded per district.

"Typically, district meetings provide an opportunity for our members to meet their incumbent trustee, as well as other trustee candidates, and visit with co-op staff," said Tim Smith, ECE general manager. "We will miss that interaction this year, but the safety of everyone involved must be our first priority."

As the country battles the coronavirus, electric co-ops around the country are coming up with creative solutions that allow them to conduct their annual business meetings with less risk. At East Central Electric, members can participate in our co-op's first drive-thru annual meeting, taking place at the co-op office in Okmulgee on September 10 from 1 pm until 7 pm. EACH DAY IS A NEW ACCOUNT:

Powering homes, farms and businesses in rural northeast Oklahoma is a point of pride for Associated Electric Cooperative, a generation and transmission cooperative located in Springfield, Missouri. If you're an electric co-op member in northeast Oklahoma, Missouri, or southeast Iowa, your electricity comes from Associated's power plants. Associated is owned by members like you and serves 2.1 million people. It's controlled through three tiers, including your local distribution cooperative East Central Electric, its transmission cooperative, and a board including representatives from each level.

"Associated generates power for electric cooperatives in our system with values learned from our member-owners," says Emery "Buster" Geisendorfer, president of Associated's board of directors. "We know they want reliable, affordable power generated in a responsible way. That's how we view the power we generate — it must meet that reliable, affordable and responsible test."

Buster says the three-tiered system — distribution, transmission and generation — is a key difference in why and how Associated generates power.

"I'm a member, too," Buster says. "Those who serve our member-owners at every level of the three-tiered system are focused on members."

Power when you need it

Providing reliable power expected by members requires different types of generation. Associated generates electricity using natural gas, coal, wind and hydropower. That diversity ensures a steady supply on the hottest, coldest, driest, windiest and calmest days. Natural gas and coal are the most reliable forms of generation because they operate around the clock,

unlike power sources that use wind, sunshine or water. Adequate supplies of natural gas and coal, including a 45- to 60-day coal stockpile on-site keep Associated's plants running.

Power at a fair price

As members ramp up their use, Associated's goal is to ensure reliability, then match members' needs to the most affordable generation resource.

Coal generation supplied about half of members' electricity in 2019. Low prices for natural gas have increased the use

of this fuel source in Associated's energy mix. Coal and natural gas are typically less expensive for generation than wind or solar sources. Hydropower, the lowest-cost source, is used as much as possible, but is limited in supply by rainfall and is controlled by the U.S Army Corps of Engineers.

Power generated the right way

A focus on members drives Associated to be a responsible caretaker of the natural environment. To balance reliable and affordable electricity with environmental responsibility is not easy or inexpensive, but Associated is committed to generating power the right way. Since 1994, Associated and its members have spent more than \$1.1 billion to reduce air emissions, resulting in more than 70 percent improvement in air quality. By adding significant amounts of wind generation, investing in environmental controls and up to date technology, Associated complies with environmental regulations at the lowest cost possible for members. "Balancing reliable and affordable electricity with environmental responsibility takes a steadfast commitment and an allocation of resources," says Buster. "It's a priority Associated takes seriously, and their experience assures that it meets the needs of its member owners. I can't imagine a better way to run a business." ❧

ELECTRICAL SAFETY TIP OF THE MONTH

Always store electrical equipment indoors and never use corded power tools in wet or damp conditions. If you notice any frayed wires, exposed cords, or any other electrical damage, make the repair or replacement as soon as you can. Try to choose power tools with insulated grips.

RECIPES



Corn and Zucchini Medley

INGREDIENTS

4 slices bacon	1 pinch pepper
2 cups chopped zucchini	¼ cup shredded
1 ½ cups fresh corn kernels	Monterey Jack cheese
1 small onion, chopped	

DIRECTIONS

Place bacon in a large, deep skillet. Cook over medium-high heat until evenly brown. Reserve 1 tablespoon of drippings. Drain bacon, chop, and set aside.

Heat the bacon drippings in the skillet over medium heat. Saute the zucchini, corn, and onion until tender but still crisp, about 10 minutes. Season with pepper.

Spoon vegetables into a bowl, and sprinkle with chopped bacon and shredded cheese.
