# Minimizing the Impact of Power Cost Adjustments

East Central Electric is a not-for-profit, member-owned electric cooperative that works hard to control costs while still providing our members with safe, reliable electricity. Our team members strive to minimize the impact of any necessary price increases. In fact, our last rate increase was in 2015 – almost a decade ago.

In that decade, we have seen run-away inflation exacerbated by a global pandemic, 100-year storms, and supply-chain failures. Each of those has played a factor in the increasing costs of fuel sources used to create electricity, and in turn, an increase in the cost of electricity for consumers.

The increasing cost of fuel is reflected in the Power Cost Adjustment (PCA) portion of each of our member's electric bills. The PCA is a pass-through cost based on the wholesale cost of fuel. The PCA is set monthly by our wholesale power suppliers, KAMO Power and Western Farmer's Electric Cooperative, and it changes based on the cost of fuel used to generate electricity.


Wholesale power suppliers generate electricity from many sources including hydroelectric dams, solar and wind farms, coal-powered steam generators, and steam generators powered by oil and natural gas. When the cost to generate power goes up, so does the PCA.

Ted Hilmes, CEO of KAMO Power, said, "KAMO Power's member distribution cooperatives will see increased power costs beginning April 2023. The increase is due to factors affecting most businesses and industries, as well as individual family budgets."

"The cost of fuel has significantly increased compared to past years, causing a direct increase to power supply costs. In addition to fuel costs, high rates of inflation, high interest rates and global supply chain congestion are increasing the costs of equipment and materials used to construct and maintain the transmission and generation assets that provide the service," Hilmes said. "Despite these real challenges, KAMO was able to minimize the cost increase to our member cooperatives through financial flexibility and operating cost control."

ECE General Manager Tim Smith emphasized that the PCA is a pass-through cost.

"In keeping with our cooperative principles, the money we receive on our member's electric bills goes out to pay for the costs of providing service," Smith said, whether that's reflected in the PCA for the cost of fuel, or the energy charge for the cost of the poles and wire that get electricity to your home. "We work hard with our industry partners to keep those costs as low as possible, every day."

#### Honors, Updates, and Trouble with Cows

March has been a busy month at the Co-op, including the Oklahoma Youth Expo in Oklahoma City. Rural Electric Co-ops from across the state are big sponsors of this event. This gives the 4-H and FFA youth a great chance to meet and rub shoulders with our political team.

The following week our Board went back to the Capitol expressly to visit with our legislators regarding upcoming legislation that is important to the co-op world. We personally visited the offices of 21 of the House of Representative members that serve in the counties we also serve. Then we personally visited the offices of 11 senators that serve our territory. We were well received and know that our time spent at the capitol last year was well remembered. Governor Stitt even came in to our meeting and visited with us!

Several years ago the Okmulgee County Cattlemen's Association developed a steer feed-out program for the 4-H and FFA students in Okmulgee County. This program helps educate all involved in the production of beef for food. There are many guidelines in the program, and the end result is a public auction of those beef calf carcasses which are sold by the half. In 2022 we raised \$118,359.00 all of which went to the participants at the close of the auction. We had fewer calves in the 2023 recent auction and gave back to the 4-H and FFA students \$86,040.75. There is no deduction taken from the participants. The cash awards given are from OCCA members' donations. All the proceeds from the calf sale go entirely to the youth. At the recent OCCA annual meeting three of the founding fathers of the Okmulgee

County Cattlemen's Association were recognized for over 50 years of dedicated service and leadership. Travis Meyers, meteorologist from Channel 6 in Tulsa, was in attendance and presented the awards to Dave Miller, Jack Lawson, and me. What a thrill it was to be a part of this group!

If you have or are planning to have an electric vehicle, East Central Electric needs to know. There is a discounted charge if you charge the car in offpeak hours; and if we know where the electric charger is located, it helps us prepare our system for the added load.



#### A QUICK GUIDE TO GENERATORS

With proper use and maintenance, generators provide great convenience during a power outage. Before you purchase a generator, determine your backup power needs to select the right size. Make a list of essential appliances and devices you'll want to power during an outage, then total the required wattage.



#### **RECOMMENDED IF YOU...**

... rarely lose power.

#### Recreational Inverter

Up to 2.000 watts

Lightweight, about 60 pounds

Quiet, easy to store

Power: fridge and a few smaller items (i.e. lamp, phone charger and home security system)

#### Midsized Inverter

Up to 3,500 watts

Weighs up to 150 pounds

Power: fridge, laptop, five to 10 lights, phone charger, home security system and 10K BTU air conditioner

... occasionally lose power. Transfer switch required.

#### **Portable Generators and Large Inverters**

Up to 7,500 watts

Weighs about 300 pounds

Power: fridge, gas furnace, 10K BTU air conditioner, dishwasher,

multiple lights, TV, laptop and more Ability to connect to home's breaker panel

... frequently lose power. Transfer switch required.

#### **Home Standby**

#### Up to 20,000 watts

Must be permanently installed; starts automatically during outage Power: nearly all home appliances and electronics (simultaneously) Can run indefinitely on natural gas or propane Recommended if you frequently lose power.

#### **SAFETY FIRST!**

- Let us know if you purchase a generator that you plan to connect to an electric panel.
- Improperly installed generators can create back feed, which is dangerous to our crews and the community. Before using the generator, disconnect the normal source of power coming into your home/business.
- Never operate a generator indoors or in an enclosed space.

Disclaimer: Please note safety requirements may differ based on the type of generator you purchase. Thoroughly read the operator's manual and know how to shut off the generator quickly.





If floodwaters are infiltrating your home, do not touch electrical equipment. Know that standing water could be energized and avoid entering floodwaters.

#### **Yellow Squash Casserole**

#### **INGREDIENTS**

6 yellow squash, sliced

1/4 C. chopped bell pepper

1/4 C. chopped onion

1 egg, beaten

1/2 C. milk

1 C. grated cheese

1 can cream of mushroom soup

16 Ritz crackers, crushed

Salt and pepper to taste

#### **DIRECTIONS**

Boil squash, onion and pepper until crisp tender; drain. Combine all other ingredients except 1/4 cup cheese and 1/3 cup crackers. Mix with squash. Pour in casserole dish and top with remaining cheese and crackers. Bake at 350° for 30 minutes.
