On average, more deaths occur due to flooding each year than from any other severe weather related hazard.

While nearly half of all flood fatalities occur in vehicles, personal contact with flood waters in your home or outdoors can also present life-threatening danger. It takes as little electricity as found in 1/50th of a standard 60 watt light bulb to cause paralysis of the muscles which results in drowning.

Follow any directives to turn off utilities. If you're advised to switch off the main power source to your home, flip each breaker and then turn off the main breaker.

Keep your power off until an electrician has inspected your system

for safety. This includes inspecting any appliances that may have been wet. A trained professional may be able to recondition some devices while others will require replacement.

It is always recommended to have a qualified electrician restore power in your home. However, if you must do it yourself, ensure your body and clothing are dry, and you are standing on a dry surface before touching a circuit breaker or fuse.

When outside, stay far away from any downed power lines especially if there is standing water nearby. Downed lines can energize dry ground up to 35 feet away. Even more in wet conditions.

ecoLINK Update

Affordable Connectivity Program

ecoLINK Fiber Services is pleased to participate in the Affordable Connectivity Program (ACP), a federal broadband assistance initiative designed to help Americans stay connected.

Formerly the Emergency Broadband Benefit (EBB), the program is an FCC benefit that helps ensure households can afford the broadband they need for work, school, healthcare, etc.

The benefit provides a discount of up to \$30 per month toward internet service for eligible households and up to \$75 per month for households on qualifying Tribal lands. Eligible households can also receive a one-time discount of up to \$100 to purchase a laptop, desktop computer, or tablet from participating providers if they contribute more than \$10 and less than \$50 toward the purchase price.

The Affordable Connectivity Program is limited to one monthly service discount and one device discount per household.

Who is Eligible?

A household is eligible for the Affordable Connectivity Program if the household income is at or below 200%

With his Bible Neil told the class that he had asked God to forgive him of his sins and through Jesus he had been forgiven. Adam and Eve had sinned in the Garden of Eden and God forgave them. David sinned with Bathsheba and God forgave him, and several others as revealed in the Bible. •Participates in certain assistance programs, such as SNAP, Medicaid, Federal Public Housing Assistance, SSI, WIC, or Lifeline;

•Participates in Tribal specific programs, such as Bureau of Indian Affairs General Assistance, Tribal TANF, or Food Distribution Program on Indian Reservations;

•Participates in the National School Lunch Program or the School Breakfast Program, including through the USDA Community Eligibility Provision; or

•Received a Federal Pell Grant during the current award year.

tomatoes	Salt and pepper to taste
