This is a life-changing event, and we are proud to offer that service. Several towns and communities have already advised us of their interest, and plans are underway to provide broadband as we complete the buildout to our members.

Talk about a life-changing event! We have learned that western Tennessee has been chosen by Ford Motor Company as a new site for their \$5.6 billion investment on a 36-acre mega campus to build next generation electric F-Series pickups and advanced batteries providing 27,000 new jobs and contribute \$3.5 billion each year to Tennessee's gross state product. It will also provide 32,000 jobs to support construction. This will change the face of that part of western Tennessee forever.

Back home we hear rumors of interest in our service territory of a Bitcoin or Cryptocurrency and Amazon location, but nothing definite. At our recent OAC

## New Application Deadlines for Operation Roundup

Beginning in 2022, application deadlines for Operation Roundup grants have changed.

Applications and supporting documents must be submitted to the co-op by the 1st day of February, May, August, and November at 4 p.m. to be considered.

Each month, co-op members make a voluntary contribution by rounding up the change at the end of their electric bill. That change funds Operation Roundup, a program to support local charitable organizations, civic groups, youth programs, community services, and needy families.

Operation Roundup has been used to help individual members and families with unexpected medical bills, storm damage repairs after a disaster, homes with a need for handicap accessible improvements, and expenses for necessities like food, clothing, and shelter after a fire.

Our members have also contributed funds to support local communities by: ensuring emergency response teams have life-saving equipment, helping homeless shelters afford resources to get people off the streets, and supporting programs that help struggling kids access the care they need to live fulfilling and productive lives.

A board of co-op members appointed by the member elected Board of Trustees meets quarterly to review applications and disburse funds.

## Savings and Safety for the Snowy Season, Continued

Heating equipment is also the second leading cause of home fires in the United States. More than 65,000 home fires are attributed to heating equipment each year, resulting in hundreds of deaths, thousands of injuries, and millions of dollars in property damage.

You can make your home a little safer by keeping anything that can burn at least 3 feet from heat sources, never leaving a space heater unattended, never plugging a space heater into an extension cord, and having a qualified service professional inspect your heating systems annually.

### Generators

Portable generators are commonly used in the winter as a result of storm-induced power outages. When used properly, portable and standby generators are a great option to provide backup power. However, safety is a huge concern.

East Central Members can purchase GenerLink meter collar devices to safely

and simply connect their generator to the main circuit panel in their home.

For additional safety, members using generators should also remember some critical safety guidelines.

Always keep generators at least 20 feet away from your home. Never operate a generator in an enclosed space. Make sure the generator has 3-4 feet of clear space on all sides for proper ventilation. Always use grounded cords and inspect cords for damage before plugging in. Always use GFCI protection. And make sure to start/stop generators when no electrical loads are connected.

### Preparedness


A winter storm can last a few hours or several days. It can cut off heat, power, and communication services. Winter storms put older adults, children, sick individuals, and pets at greater risk.

Know your risk for winter storms by paying attention to weather reports and listening for emergency information and alerts.

Know your winter weather terms, like how a “Watch” differs from a “Warning,” and what that means for your family.

Know the signs and symptoms of Hypothermia and Frostbite and what actions you should take to protect yourself and the people you love.

## Fern's Lasagna

### INGREDIENTS

- |                                |   |
|--------------------------------|---|
| 3 lb. ground beef              | 1 medium can tomato sauce                         |
| 4 pkg. dry spaghetti sauce mix | 1 large can V-8 juice                             |
| 1 large can chopped tomatoes   | 1 lb. box lasagna noodles                         |
|                                | 2 lb. Monterey Jack and mozzarella cheese, grated |

### DIRECTIONS

Brown meat, drain and add spaghetti sauce mixes and canned goods. Simmer 5 minutes. Layer uncooked noodles, sauce, and cheese into a broiler pan. Bake at 350° for one hour, tightly covered with foil. Remove from oven, let stand 10 minutes before serving.
