Conquer Hot Temps and High Bills

Summer months can bring higher energy costs and cause high demand on the electric grid. Keeping your home comfortable can be expensive.

Implementing energy efficiency solutions can lower your summer electric bills, keep your home cool, and reduce demand on the grid.

Efficiency

One cost effective step: update your insulation. This will keep cool air in your home and hot air out. You can add more insulation on top of existing insulation in your walls and attic.

Ventilate the attic. When the outside temperature is in the 90s, your attic can easily reach 140 degrees Fahrenheit. Adequately sized vents or an attic fan can help keep hot air from building up.

Get the air conditioner ready. Shut off power to the unit before you clean. On the inside, wash or vacuum cleanable filters and replace disposable ones. Outside, clear leaves and other debris away from the unit. Hose off any accumulated dirt. It is a good idea to call a professional to inspect your unit in the spring or early in the summer.

On moderate days, turn off the air conditioner and open windows and doors and let outside air cool your house. On hotter days, consider investing in a programmable thermostat. Leave it on a higher temperature while you're away, and set it to cool the house half an hour before you return home.

Close blinds, shades or draperies during the hottest part of the day. Consider planting fast-growing trees and shrubs near your home, but away from power lines, to provide shade. You can also look into installing awnings over windows exposed to direct sunlight.

If you are shopping for a new air conditioning unit, look for one with the blue Energy Star label. An Energy Star air conditioner will save money in the long run by using less electricity. East Central Electric Cooperative Members can also take advantage of a \$50 rebate on the purchase of a Energy Star rated room air conditioning unit. Visit the ECE website or call for details.

Temperature extremes have a serious impact on electric costs. On average, heating and cooling make up 42 percent of your annual energy bill.

Keep Your Cool While the Power's Out

Severe summer storms can cause outages that last days. When a power outage occurs during hot weather, take steps to maintain safety and comfort until power is restored.

Remember to call your co-op immediately to report the outage.

Dress in loose, lightweight clothing and stay on the coolest, lowest level of your home.

Use natural ventilation to cool homes, and consider purchasing battery-powered fans.

Drink plenty of water and avoid heavy meals, caffeinated drinks and alcohol.

Keep refrigerator or freezer doors closed. A freezer that is half full or full can keep foods frozen 24 to 48 hours. Foods can stay safe in an unopened refrigerator up to four hours. If an outage lasts longer than four hours, remove and pack meat, milk and other dairy products in a cooler with ice.

Use safe alternative food preparations, like an outdoor grill.

Check on friends and relatives especially children, seniors, and those with medical conditions or disabilities. These people may need to seek emergency cooling shelters.

Keep a first-aid kit in your home and one in your car.

Close all drapes and blinds on the sunny side of your residence.

Take your family and pets to a basement or other cool location if you have one. Also consider going to an air-conditioned public place during warmer daytime hours.

Five Tips for Hiring an Electrician

A licensed electrician can help with a variety of home projects from lighting upgrades to full renovations. Keep the following tips in mind if you're looking to hire an electrician.



1. Hire a licensed, qualified electrician for the job.

Look for a master electrician to manage the project. Master electricians have the most experience and will often oversee the work of a journey-level electrician or apprentice.

2. Make sure the electrician is insured.

Seasoned electricians know the importance of protecting themselves in case of an accident.

3. Read *all* the reviews.

Hire an electrician that has several positive reviews – not just one or two. Read reviews on different sites, like Nextdoor, Yelp and HomeAdvisor, and consider asking your neighbors for recommendations.

4. Determine your budget. Get two quotes.

Knowing your budget upfront helps move the process along. Prices can greatly vary, so get multiple quotes (at least two).

5. Talk timeline.

Some electricians accidentally overbook projects. If your job is time-sensitive, convey that early on and discuss a realistic timeline with the electrician.
