Dear ECE Member,

In the 85-year history of East Central Oklahoma Electric Cooperative, we have come full circle building a 6,400 mile electric grid from the ground up and connecting our members to reliable, highspeed internet through ecoLINK fiber.

Our story began with a handful of local farmers and ranchers who wanted to improve the quality of life available to rural Oklahomans. When big corporations refused to provide power because they couldn't turn a profit, the rural folks made it happen by working together to provide electricity where no one else would. Neighbors talked to neighbors, community meetings were held, and on

November 15, 1938, East Central Oklahoma Electric Cooperative was formed.

In the intervening decades, the co-op grew from one small substation at Bald Hill to 23 substations spanning a 3,000 square mile service area and connecting over 36,000 meters to electric power.

In 2018, members of East Central Oklahoma Electric Cooperative had a similar realization to the one they had decades prior. Internet access was not shared equally. Rural communities were being passed over for high-speed internet connection because big companies could not make a profit. And so, by working together, we made it happen again. In early 2019, construction began to bring ecoLINK fiber optic internet and phone services to rural homes and businesses.

2022 proved to be a milestone year for our co-op. In July we celebrated 10,000 ecoLINK installations. We surpassed 36,000 meters connected to the electric grid. And we were able to return approximately \$1 million in would-be profits to our co-op members in the form of capital credits, reaching a milestone of over \$30 million returned to our member's pockets since 1963.

We've always gone the extra mile for our members, and in 2023, as we celebrate the 85th anniversary of our co-op, we will also be celebrating the completion of our fiber project.

East Central Electric Cooperative was built by our membership, belongs to our membership,

and continues to be led by our membership. We have truly come full circle, all thanks to you, our members.



The books and financial statements of East Central Oklahoma Electric Cooperative, Inc. are audited each year as of December 31. An audit for the year ended December 31, 2022, has been completed by the firm of Briscoe, Burke & Grigsby LLP, Certified Public Accountants, Tulsa, OK. The Comparative Financial Statements shown here are for the years ended December 31, 2021 and 2022. East Central Electric's balance sheet reflects 14.99 percent increase in assets. Capital credits and membership fees increased by \$5,434,607, which gave our members an equity level of 28.6 percent.




